The break afforded the chance for projects at BNCC to be undertaken. The roof was replaced and solar panels will soon be installed atop the new roof. Most of the car park redevelopment was completed, with the final bitumen layers being laid at the moment. We are most appreciative of the relationship between the City of Ballarat and U3A Ballarat and we thank them for the work they have been doing and for the planning that minimised disruption to the programs of the tenants at BNCC.

Many thanks to all involved with unwrapping and storing the new chairs at BNCC. As indicated beforehand, we were given 24 hours notice of their arrival and once they were delivered it was essential to get them unwrapped and stored promptly so that the Hall could be used again.

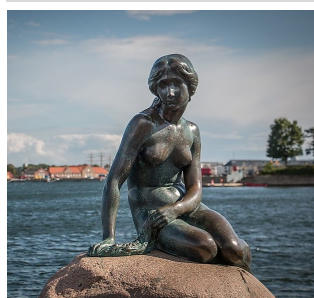


We plan on resuming swap tables in September when our Spring produce is to hand.

We are seeking tutors and class groups willing to run an activity to showcase U3A during the Seniors Festival this October. Available venues and dates include:

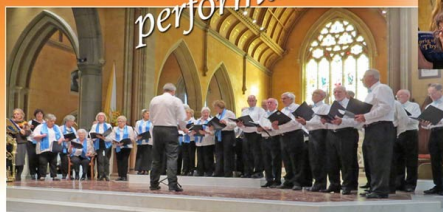

BOOK CLUB 2, *Yvette Nesire-McNeil, Facilitator 0434 630 456, Helen McDowell, Class Rep 0407 347 779*

This month we reviewed, *Kings in Grass Castles*, by *Mary Durack*.

This book tells the story of the Durack family who explored, settled and managed a vast cattle empire from Queensland to the Kimberly in the mid to late 1800s, based on family chronicles, predominantly those of Patrick (Patsy) Durack, 1853 – 1898, Mary's grandfather.

Patsy was a man of vision, courage, determination and faith. His enthusiasm, leadership and practical capability encouraged other family members and friends, including some remarkable women, to join him on his epic journeys into unknown territory to find their fortunes.

There are accounts of contact with the indigenous population, showing Patsy to be respectful of their culture and grateful for their assistance and loyalty on many occasions. This attitude was not universal, with intolerance frequently leading to conflict, prompting the reader to consider the impact and legacy of this intrusion of settlers with their thousands of animals, on the environment and those who originally occupied it.

The book is a good yarn about Mary's family history as interpreted by her, enjoyed by the group, and recommended to anyone interested in Australian history. 6/10

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTER PROGRAMMING.

This is a class for those who have never done any computer programming. Programming is translating ideas into code. For this, ideas need to be organised and code designed using techniques like abstraction, recursion, concurrency, repetition, documentation, and simulation. It's not just about learning a computer language, it's also about developing analytical thinking, synthesis, creativity, organising, and record keeping skills.

Our long term programming project will be to teach a computer to play 'Noughts and Crosses', and along the way there will be many fun little games and exercises. The classes will be lots of hands on doing, and there will be homework!

We will use two languages, firstly SNAP! and then moving on to Python if time allows. SNAP! is a very easy and friendly programming language. It is graphical, simply dragging blocks around and building bigger blocks out of smaller blocks. It lets you focus on the thinking and logic, rather than having to master tricky language. Python is also very easy to learn, and uses mostly plain English with minimal obscure words or symbols.

We will meet every week, on Thursdays between 1pm and 3pm, at Pinarc, which is the old Golden Point primary school in English St (just near the Sovereign Hill Gold Museum). You must email me ken.m.u3a@gmail.com before enrolling for approval and for further class requirements.

Among these requirements are a laptop computer, and a good up-to-date web browser. The laptop can be any of Linux, Windows or Mac, but tablets and phones are not ok. You will need to have WiFi because we will be connecting to that for the classes. The browser should be Firefox, Chrome, or Safari...Internet Explorer and Edge are not suitable. All materials will be provided, and there may be a small charge (\$10 or so) for photocopying and other stationary items.

PAINTING GROUP

Recently our Painting Group (seventeen in number) enjoyed a visit to two local galleries. First gallery on the program was the Zenart Australia Studio managed by Glynis Bryden at Dereel. Glynis majored in drawing and ceramics. She has broadened her areas of expertise to include painting, mosaic, papermaking, bookbinding and 3D garden art. Glynis has many examples of these disciplines on display in her studio which comprises many refurbished large sheds. The handmade upcycled birdhouses are a real treat!

Next stop was the studio of Anne Langdon at Smythesdale. Anne is a well-known artist, who in the last year has focussed on printmaking, sculpture, painting and working in a mixed media. Anne combines prints and painting which often creates a more textural collage effect. She enjoys printmaking and extends the genre into textile based works. She draws inspiration from her local environment. Her involvement with Goldfield Printmakers allows her to show her skills to potential artists and to experience a wonderful sense of community fellowship. Both Glynis and Anne spoke to our group about their work.
